Professor David Bellamy was star guest at this year's Green Schools' Conference held at Hartford High School, designed to support and inspire teachers through workshops and networking opportunities.

Ceramicist Jean Crocker was producing "hands-on" (sometimes literally) work, while

Hysterical Historical Players performed first as three man-fearing trees, then as David Beckham, David Bellamy and David Attenborough. The real Professor David Bellamy enthused over his experiences earlier that day helping children pond dipping at Marshall's Arm. A "cheque" was presented, representing INEOS Chlor's school grants scheme: £2000 to be made available for environmental projects in the coming year.

The workshops were:

Creative interpretation of Local Heritage (using creative arts and language to help children tell the story of their local heritage);

Eco –Days (sustainability and environmental education); Education for Sustainable Development (Emma Robson presented the new Cheshire County Council resource); Every photo tells a story;

Global Links (Sustainable eco-links with China and beyond);

Eco-schools (two schools describe what they got from going for their Green Flags); and School Grounds Development (to aid the curriculum and even behaviour).



### **CHAIN** meeting

CHAIN (Cheshire Against Incinerators) met at Wincham Community Centre on 25<sup>th</sup> May, with Dr Paul Connett, Alison Hunter, Cllr Malcolm Gaskill, Rachael Heaps and Ralph Ryder, to hear why proposals for an incinerator at Lostock, or elsewhere in Cheshire (as suggested by the Draft Cheshire Replacement Waste Local Plan, out for consultation at the time), should be fought.

Paul Connett is an authority on the harmful effects of incinerators, and described their formation during

ombustion. In the US, notices on the perimeter fences of incinerators warn of hazardous chemicals both inside and outside the compound. Both he and Ralph Ryder, who has worked downwind of an incinerator and didn't enjoy it, remarked on some of the bad practice that goes on. A Dutch researcher found a standard 6 hour test, with advance notice, gave results far better than a two week monitor. Emissions include heavy metals and dioxins and furans. Dioxins and furans are carcinogenic and interfere with genes and hormones. Metals such as mercury are bioaccumulative. Paul stated that not only does recycling make more jobs, but energy is saved: the energy that goes into making a product is more than that released on incineration, which again is more than any usable energy due to stack losses etc. Incinerators also produce other wastes, in the form of fly ash and bottom ash, which will contain the nasties the stack emissions don't.

Alison Hunter, recycling officer for Vale Royal Borough Council, described the new recycling scheme and how well it was running, which almost started another debate!

Cllr Gaskill stated the Lib-Dem anti-incineration stance.

Rachael Heaps proposed that we ensure our workplaces cut their waste, for if domestic waste became unavailable due to recycling, the high quality and consistency of commercial waste would make a good feedstock. If local supplies fail, waste would have to be brought from afar to feed the incinerator.

# Gardeners' Fun

April's meeting of Vale Royal Organic and Wildlife Gardeners, theme "Fruitful Fertility" saw fertility rites in the form of half the meeting learning belly dancing. May's meeting saw Peter Woollam enthusing on the usual and less than usual crops on

his weedless holding in Alderley Edge. Among these are potato beans, whose boiled tubers taste like baked potatoes; the hardy Japanese Yam; the Madeira Vine, with succulent edible leaves but grown for its tubers; the annual, 8' high Tree Spinach; the gaudy flowers



of Amaranth, whose seeds can be ground for bread; and the Yellow Asphodel with the flowers tasting of peas. He also talked of Stevia, a plant whose leaves are so intensely sweet that care has to be taken if used for sweetening. His garden is open under the HDRA scheme on Sat 7<sup>th</sup> and Sun 8<sup>th</sup> August, noon to 5pm, at Hough Garden, Hough Lane, Alderley Edge; admission £1 for adults, children free. On show will be over 100 varieties of vegetables, with edible flowers, herbs and fruit. There'll be a plant stall, willow weavings (seats, tunnel, arbour, fedge [hedge x fence hybrid]..) and refreshments. Plans for future meetings (third Friday of the month) include "Extending the Growing Season", "Willow Weaving", "Wormeries", "Companion Planting", a social and a plant sale. ### Get the Blighters!

Potato Blight is the scourge of potato and tomato growers, amateur and professional. It overwinters on infected tubers left in the ground, dumped, or erroneously planted. It spreads to the foliage, producing brown patches and spores which can travel miles, or wash into the soil to infect new tubers. The British Potato Council is requesting all growers to watch out for the disease, which forms black patches on the leaves. If infection is light, remove the affected leaves and those nearby, and bury them in the compost heap. Heavier infestations may require you to cut the tops off whole plants. If you want them, leave the potatoes underground for 3 weeks to prevent infection from surface spores, otherwise compost in black plastic until they rot. Current advice is that blighted material can be composted, provided it's buried to stop spore spread. Other tips: buy certified seed; try resistant varieties and "earlies"; earth up or mulch the crop, and extract all tubers.

# **Organic Food for All**

The Henry Doubleday Research Association, promoters of organic gardening, are seeking to help everyone, especially those on low incomes, to grow organic food on any available land. Balconies and windowsills are useful, but gardens, allotments and wasteland are also sought. In addition, mentors experienced vegetable growers, willing to be trained in organic ways, are required to lead projects. They'll get support and special benefits. They also want to establish a second-hand tool pool. # **Nuisance Hedges**

The Anti-Social

Behaviour Act of 2003 includes hedges. An owner of a domestic property who can allege that a hedge that "his reasonable enjoyment of that property is being adversely affected by the height of a high hedge situated on land owned or occupied by another person" can make a complaint. The hedge must be mainly evergreen, a "barrier to light", at least 2 metres high and neither thin out significantly at 2m or have gaps in it. Full details of the act can be found at


# Renewables in Cheshire: Where, When and How?

# No Juice?

Friends of the Earth's (FoE) latest guide to renewable electricity suppliers lists four available in this area: Ecotricity Old Energy Tariff, Green Energy 100, Good Electricity (formerly unit[e]), and RSPB Energy.

Their ranking is based on how much they encourage new renewable energy generation additional to the statutory minimum, and on how much the company also relies on fossil or nuclear generation. Each electricity supplier receives Renewable Obligation Certificates (ROCs) when it purchases renewable electricity. They also have to hand in ROCs equivalent to 3% (rising to 10% in 2010) of the electricity they sell. FoE points out that a problem with traditional suppliers is that as long as their green tariff customers remain in small numbers, their green electricity counts towards the 3% of renewables that they are legally bound to supply. Their mainstream customers can receive more fossil power. Suppliers of 100% renewable electricity receive ROCs for all that. 3% they have to hand in by law; the rest they could sell on to other companies to contribute to their 3%. With the shortage of renewable capacity, this is lucrative and helps to reduce the price for green customers. However, these four tariffs 'retire' a proportion, thus forcing the market. Their recommendations are (these all supply 100% renewable electricity):

**Ecotricity Old Energy Tariff:** source: Wind. Hold onto 11% of the ROCs. www.ecotricity.co.uk/ or 08000 326 100.

Good Energy 75% wind, 25% hydro. Holds onto 7% of the ROCs. Good Energy was previously known as unit[e]. www.good-energy.co.uk/, enquiries@unit-e.co.uk, 0845 456 1640

Green energy 100 50% wind, 49% hydro, 1% solar. Invest 50% of profits in green electricity generation and hold onto 6.8% of the certificates of proof from these projects. Subscribers also become shareholders. Green Energy UK,


RSPB Energy 90% hydro, 5% wind, 5% landfill gas. Holds onto 10% of the ROCs. For each customer, £30 in the first year and thereafter £5/year is spent on environmental schemes. Scottish and Southern Energy plc. www.southern-

Unfortunately these will generally cost (financially) more than your present supplier: for details visit www.greenprices.com/uk/pricesbox.asp . Schools, councils and other not large public organisations can purchase 100% renewable electricity at conventional prices through an OGCbuying solutions/British Gas deal - capitalising on bulk purchase.

#### The Place for Wind Turbines

Wind speeds at sea are higher than on land, where the best speeds (assuming level terrain) are on the coast. Offshore installations are more expensive than onshore, and cabling costs rise with increasing distance from the shore. As a result, the feasibility, and hence electricity price, of turbines 6km at sea is the same as those 6km inland, but the best value is for those on the shore. # Bus Stops on the M6?

The Highways Agency is conducting a series of public consultations on the various stretches of the M6, including that from Cannock (junction 11a) to Warrington (junction 20). They're interested in problems of congestion, safety, and useability, as



well as pollution, litter and noise, with a view to setting a strategy plan for the next 10-15 years. The plan will identify where problems lie and where investment may be needed. They aim to make better use of existing roads rather than building anew. They hope to receive feedback from a wide spectrum of users, by 23rd August 2004. 

### **Road Engineering for Cyclists**

The spring 2004 Sustrans Supporters' Newsletter includes hints to help cyclists, and others:

- Continue cycle tracks across side roads, entrances, etc
- 2. Allow contra-flow cycling on one-way streets
- Allow cycling where motor vehicles are forbidden
- 4. Combine a zebra crossing with cycle crossing, preferable raised
- 5. Sinusoidal ups and downs on road humps, and flush kerbs at crossings
- 6. Special roundabout design
- 7. 20 mph zones
- 8. Cycle lanes on narrow roads can calm traffic speed
- Adjust traffic signs to change when pedestrians or cyclists arrive, not when there is a traffic gap

# Inspirations

The National Trust has done a minor modification to its handbook. When listing ways to get to its properties, they now come in the order of by foot, bike, bus, train, ferry and finally road.

Pedal Back the Years (PBTY), an initiative between Sustrans, the Cornwall Local Health Action Zone and many other partners, helps sedentary inactive adults, at risk from future health problems, to become active. It boosts confidence, broadens social worlds, and teaches new skills. It offers three cycle rides weekly, of 5 to 10 miles, on mostly traffic-free routes in Cornwall.

**Bracknell Vision**: in redeveloping Bracknell town centre, the council, with support from a CONCERTO grant, plan to install district heating, cooling and power, possibly run on thinnings from local woodlands. They're also aiming for highest possible building energy efficiencies, and may include wind and solar installations.

Seattle has ordered 230 **hybrid (diesel/electric) buses**, which offer 60% greater fuel efficiency than conventional buses.
